Spirituality of the readings
Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time: Humility

Today's reading begins with a prophet we seldom here proclaimed, Zephaniah. They deal with a subject we usually avoid, humility. And they go to the heart of our Christian life, our relationship with God. The word humility is best understood when we consider its origin, humus. Humus is used in farming. Farmers call humus black gold. What is humus? It is a composition of decayed plant and animal matter. Rather ignoble. But, when humus is mixed with soil it becomes the richest part of the soil. If a farmer tills it or breaks it open to receive the seed, and the Lord provides sufficient rainfall and sunlight,

the rich humus soil will yield the most bountiful harvest and the most beautiful flowers. All three of today's readings refer to humility. The prophet Zephaniah calls the faithful Israelites the humble of the earth. He conveys the promise of the Lord that even when God's anger comes upon the world, a remnant of people will remain who are humble and lowly. They will not be deceitful or perjure themselves. They will be open to God working in them rather than be crammed full of themselves.

Humility is being open to God's presence. A proud person does not need God. He or she is a god to himself or herself. The original sin described in Genesis was the sin of pride. Adam and Eve were too full of themselves to need God. The serpent touched a sensitive nerve when he told them that if they ate the apple they would be like gods. They did not eat because they were hungry. They ate because they were proud. A humble person needs God. A humble person fears what he or she might become without God in his or her life. A humble person recognizes God's presence in others, God's truth in different ways of thought, and God's actions in his own life. A humble person seeks the Lord wherever He may be found.

Humility is allowing God to work through us for others. Humility is being less concerned with what we do or how we do it and being more concerned with having a life dialogue with God. Humility is taking a step away from ourselves and a step into the presence of God to allow Him to work his wonders through us. Modern life is complex. So are modern people. Modern people try to balance their personal needs with the natural need to form lasting relationships. Many want to be giving, yet with limits. For example, many people are not willing or not ready to commit to marriage, but they still want the physical, emotional and financial benefits of marriage; so they live together rather than marry forming what is fundamentally a selfish relationship that by its nature says, "I'll stay with you as long as this is pleasing to me." Then they are astounded that their partner is selfish. When some attempt to make the transition from living together to marriage, they are shocked at how difficult the adjustment is. It is a philosophical leap to go from a life revolving around fulfilling one's needs to a life revolving around giving oneself to another. As a result, there is a higher rate of divorce for those who live together prior to their marriage.

And Jesus went up a mountain. After he had sat down his disciples gathered around him, and he began to teach them: "How blest are the poor in spirit: the reign of God is theirs..."

And Jesus went up a mountain and said, "Simplify your lives. Let me simplify your lives. Just trust in God, and don't let your lives revolve around other things. Be poor in spirit. Don't mourn the loss of possessions, mourn for those who have lost their souls. Accept the presence of God in your lives, recognize your need for God and inherit the Promised Land. Don't be two-faced, and double-dealing. Be simple and single-hearted and you will be capable of enjoying the Vision of God. Bring God's peace to others and assume the mission of his angels, be sons of God. And if you are mocked for this simplicity, this humility, so what? Your reward in heaven is great."

The humble enter into a dialogue with God to seek that which really matters. And the only things that matter in life are those that flow from God and those that lead back to God. Today we pray for humility.

Domingo IV del Tiempo Ordinario (Ciclo A)
(29 de enero de 2023)

El tema central de las lecturas de hoy son las Bienaventuranzas. Jesús nos presenta los valores que han de guiar nuestra vida cristiana: pobreza, mansedumbre, llorar con los que lloran, el hambre y sed de la justicia, la misericordia, la limpieza de corazón, trabajar por la paz, soportar la persecución por Cristo y su reino. Valores contrarios a los poderes de este mundo, que no nos integran en el Cuerpo de Cristo, quien por pura gracia ha escogido lo débil del mundo, para que nadie pueda gloriarse sino en el Señor. Las bienaventuranzas son un programa de vida. Así lo ha visto la tradición de la Iglesia. Sin embargo, no ha sido tan común explicar el camino de la vida espiritual dividido en las etapas marcadas por el Sermón de la Montaña. San Agustín estableció que las bienaventuranzas trazan las siete etapas del progreso en la vida espiritual y, además, asociaba a cada una de ellas a uno de los siete dones del Espíritu Santo: pobreza de espíritu y temor de Dios; la mansedumbre y el don de piedad; las lágrimas de la oración y el don de la ciencia; el hambre de la justicia con la fortaleza; misericordia y don de consejo; pureza de corazón e inteligencia; la paz de los hijos de Dios y el don de la sabiduría. La octava de las bienaventuranzas de Mateo (en Lucas son cuatro) expresa, según él, la perfección de todos los grados precedentes.

El camino cristiano arranca en el temor del Señor y la pobreza de espíritu. Hoy es poco común hablar desde el púlpito del temor, a pesar de que es eso, don de Dios. Tiene mala prensa todo lo suena con una actitud temerosa. Pero si se entiende bien cobra sentido. San Agustín distingue tres tipos de temor. El primero, a los males de este mundo, al que podemos calificar como carnal y servil, no produce la conversión y con él no se ama ni adora a Dios; no está de moda en nuestros días y, efectivamente, no es bueno ni para la vida cristiana ni para el bienestar mental. El segundo, a las penas del infierno, es decir, a las consecuencias de la falta de conversión a Dios; es también temor servil, alejado del ideal, pero, sin embargo, útil para acercarnos a Dios. Por no ser ideal no existirá siempre, será sustituido por el tercero, llamado a permanecer. Se trata del que San Agustín califica como casto y filial, nacido del amor, consistente en temer el alejamiento o ausencia del amado, Dios. Este temor es bueno y útil. El santo pone un ejemplo para ilustrar ambos temores. Imagina dos mujeres, una casta y la otra adúltera. La primera teme que su marido se aleje, la segunda que regrese. Si el marido está lejos, la adúltera teme que llegue mientras la casta teme su retraso. En cierto modo, nuestro señor Jesucristo, el Esposo, se encuentra lejos. El cristiano, o sea, tú y yo amigo lector, preguntémosnos si deseamos que venga y lo haga cuanto antes o, más bien, preferimos que se retrase. Salta a la vista que el temor casto nace del amor.

Si éste es el primer peldaño en el ascenso espiritual, su complemento necesario es la pobreza de espíritu, identificada con la humildad. Del temor de Dios nace la humildad, inicio de la conversión y de la sabiduría. Si la soberbia es la primera causa del pecado, la humildad es el primer paso para volver a Dios. No se trata de una etapa a superar, es necesaria para todo el camino, puesto que la humildad se integra en la perfección.

Ahora bien, ¿qué es la humildad? Si la soberbia es el amor propio hasta no reconocer la dependencia de Dios ni su ley, identificándose así con la mentira, la humildad es el reconocimiento de la verdad. La humildad la que nos hace asumir que somos hombres y debemos someternos a la voluntad de Dios; nos recuerda, también, los propios pecados, llevándonos al arrepentimiento y la confesión. Por último, nos lleva a tomar conciencia de nuestra incapacidad para evitar el mal y hacer el bien, mostrándonos así la necesidad de la gracia. Además, es una virtud específicamente cristiana; no es extraño que nuestro pensamiento contemporáneo la ignore.

Siendo sinónimo de humildad, la pobreza de espíritu no es solamente reconocerse criatura, someterse a la voluntad de Dios y reconocer los propios pecados. El pobre de espíritu evita atribuirse a sí mismo el bien que cumple. Pobres de espíritu son los pobres del espíritu propio y ricos del Espíritu de Dios. El creyente no debe sentirse en abundancia sino reconocerse pobre; incluso si posee riquezas, debe convencerse de que esas no son verdaderas riquezas, para desear otras. Quien de hecho anhela riquezas falsas no va en busca de las verdaderas, mientras que quien busca las verdaderas riquezas mientras busca es un pobre y puede con razón decir que lo es. ¿Cuáles son las verdaderas riquezas? La verdadera riqueza es la verdadera salud que se tendrá cuando con la resurrección final no nos falte ya nada y no tengamos más necesidad de nada. En esta vida terrenal hay que sentirse míseros y pobres para desear ser saciados de la fuente de toda justicia y salud de alma y cuerpo. Esta pobreza de espíritu, que hace que nos reconozcamos débiles e indigentes, es indispensable para hacernos fuertes y ser saciados por Dios. ¡Qué difícil esta mentalidad en una sociedad del bienestar como la nuestra! ¿Verdad? Por lo tanto, temor de Dios, humildad y conversión son las realidades que caracterizan el primer estadio en el camino de la vida espiritual según San Agustín, la primera de las bienaventuranzas. Es la etapa de la infancia espiritual. Quien está en esta fase debe vivir conforme a la inocencia de los niños, alejando de sí toda malicia, engaño, hipocresía, envidia, maledicencia, y mantener la inocencia recuperada, de tal modo que no se pierda durante el resto de las etapas del crecimiento. El signo distintivo de esta infancia es la humildad, con la que se reconoce la primacía de Dios y su voluntad. En esta fase el espíritu de la persona comienza la vuelta así mismo después de estar desperdigado por el mundo externo, y se pone frente a sí mismo, como en un espejo, no para detenerse en su imagen sino para ponerse en la presencia de Dios, reconocer la propia miseria y el primado de la voluntad del creador. Esta humildad supone una conversión que implica la fe en Dios de la que es el temor una expresión.

Lo hemos escuchado en la primera lectura: "Buscad la justicia, buscad la humildad". No se trata, sin embargo, de la humildad que predicaron los libros y gurús de la autoayuda, de perfil meramente psicológico. Se trata de reconocer la verdad de quienes somos ante Dios, nuestra dependencia y, al tiempo, la grandeza de nuestra vocación. Esta situación respecto a Dios nos iguala a todos los hombres y nos hace siervos del prójimo. Va de la mano con la caridad para con los demás y genera buena convivencia. ¡Qué agradable es convivir con los humildes! Quien es humildemente generoso reconoce que el único tipo de pecado que la caridad debe cubrir es el inexcusable, y que el único orgullo completamente condenable es el de quien tiene algo de que presumir. El único orgullo que no hace daño es el que se basa en cosas que no son mérito nuestro, como no hace daño estar orgulloso del propio país o de los antepasados. Pero es malo el orgullo de haber ganado dinero, de tener títulos o, peor aún, de la propia inteligencia. Y lo que más daño hace es estar orgulloso de lo que más vale, a saber, la propia bondad. Quien está orgulloso de sus propios méritos es un fariseo, de esos que se convirtieron en objeto de las críticas de Cristo. Por el contrario, sintámonos orgullosos de que Cristo haya muerto por nosotros, de ser amados por Dios singularmente. Es la forma, quizá única, de ser pobres de espíritu, dando frutos justicia y de caridad. Que para ello nos ayude la eucaristía que celebramos.

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
